



The Bell of Freedom
cannot be Unrung

On January 1, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation, declaring "that all persons held as slaves" within rebel states "are, and henceforward shall be free."

Bells rang out in jubilant peal as word of the Proclamation resounded across the nation.

Before that momentous stroke of the pen, an inflection point in American history, advocates of abolition had been working tirelessly for decades – men and women who demanded justice, equality, dignity, and freedom.

It's time their stories are tolled.

Join us as we build a community amphitheater and carillon in Southeast D.C. to honor the legacy of American abolitionists.

A concert-grade grand carillon of 52 bells across four octaves will rise from a wooded knoll in Southeast D.C., joining the family of carillons in the District (Washington National Cathedral, Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, Netherlands Carillon, et al.) as the first of its kind east of the Anacostia River at a scale that's more approachable and accessible to audience and artists alike.

This new carillon, **ring of 12 swinging peal bells**, amphitheater, and garden will stand in commemoration of the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation, with each of the bells named in honor of an abolitionist who worked to end slavery in America. The bells will keep the voices of abolitionists and the spirit of freedom alive and ringing.

Set in a wooded park adjacent to the Bridge District, the structure's New Formalist architecture shelters, engages, and inspires.



O'Brien & Keane Architecture is leading the design of the space, with support from Royal Eijsbouts and John Taylor & Co. bell foundries.

Your support will allow us to foster local arts and community and:

- * **Build the Emancipation Bells carillon**, comprising 52 concert-pitch bells across 4 octaves with a fully-chromatic keyboard range: F, G, B^b, C4 to C8, and an additional ring of 12 swinging peal bells.
- * **Curate a season of performances** throughout the temperate months (spring to autumn) with weekly concerts that are free and open to everyone.
- * **Fund annual scholarships** for area residents to study at the North American Carillon School and to continue their education, practice, and recitals in D.C.
- * Offer grants for local composers to write music for the instrument and to enable guest artist collaborations with other musicians and ensembles.
- * **Inspire the next generation of community leaders** by showcasing the histories and stories of prominent abolitionists and civil rights activists.
- * **Provide a welcoming and accessible space** for community performances, lectures, outdoor classes, and weddings, even when the carillon is not in use.

An additional single bell on the grounds will be tolled at moments of distinct importance.

Hung separately from the carillon and supported by an allegorical figure in bronze, this bell will be sounded during special programing on four occasions annually:

- The date the Proclamation was announced
- The date the Proclamation took effect
- D.C. Emancipation Day
- Juneteenth

The National Bell Festival, together with our partners and donors, has pledged to raise \$2 million to bring the Emancipation Bells carillon, garden, and amphitheater to life.


